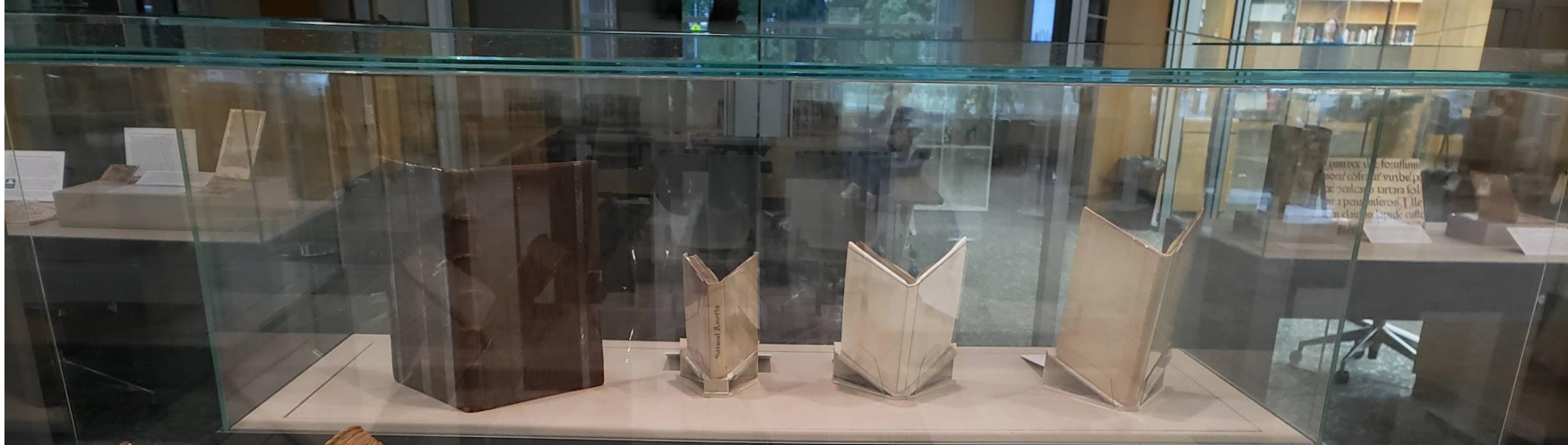

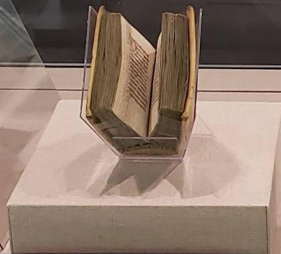
Introduction

It all started with a coffee date in 2012...

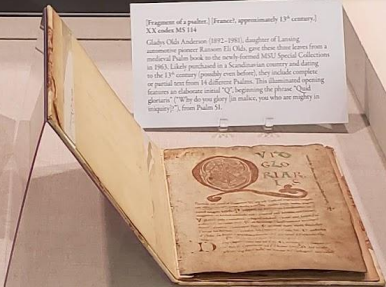




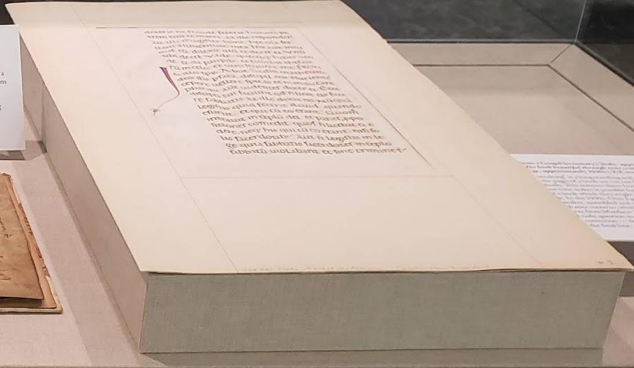
[Book of Hours] [Paris, approximately 1400, LXX codes MSS 2]
The calendar that opens this Book of Hours borrows its French origins in the language in which the holidays are named. For January these include the feast days of Saint Lawrence, Saint Polycarp, and Saint Agnes (twice). The most important holidays are written in red, often the phrase "In domo dei" to denote a day of special significance. On the right are two usual features of medieval calendars: First is the letter of the month, a trick to be done during that time, which here is solely to keep warm by the fire. Below is an illustration of the sign of the Zodiac for January—Aquarius, the Water Bearer.

The handle is an early form of an illuminated Book of Hours in very small, making it easy for the reader but making it possible to carry the book conveniently in a pocket or bag. Since these prayer books were meant for personal devotion and were rarely more than to be used than to be seen, they did not always have to be lavish productions. Like the other Book of Hours in this case, which no doubt was meant to show off the wealth of its owner.

Claire Obi Anderson (1917-1981), daughter of Lansing automobile pioneer Ransom Eli Olds, gave these three leaves from a medieval Psalm book to the newly formed MSS Special Collections in 1963. Likely produced in a Scandinavian country and dating in the 13th century, possibly even Iceland, they include complete or partial text from 14 different Psalms. This illuminated opening features an elaborate initial "C" beginning the phrase "Quia gloriatus es in diebus tuis in malis; tu qui es in regno in sempiternum," from Psalm 51.

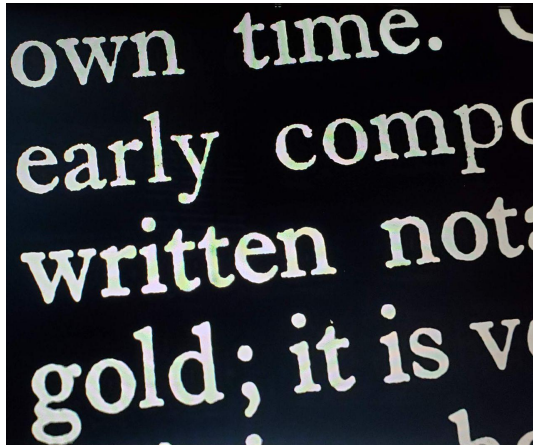

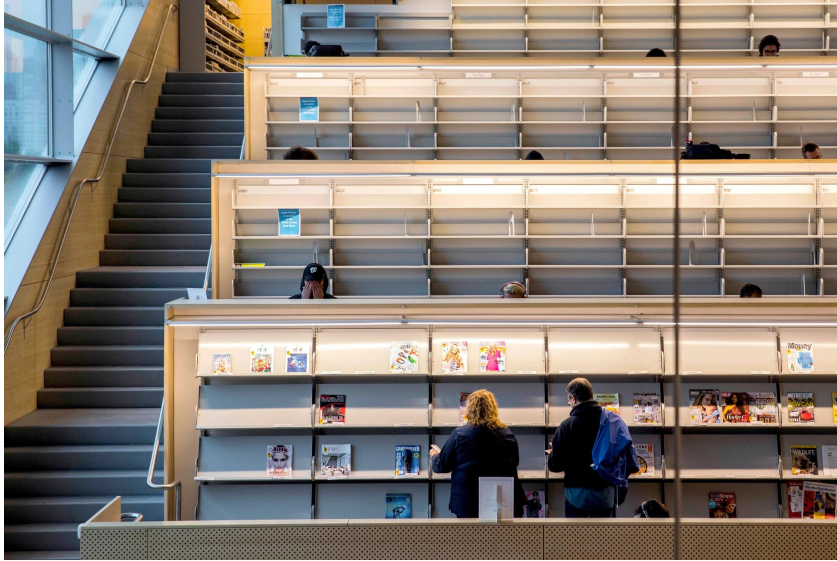

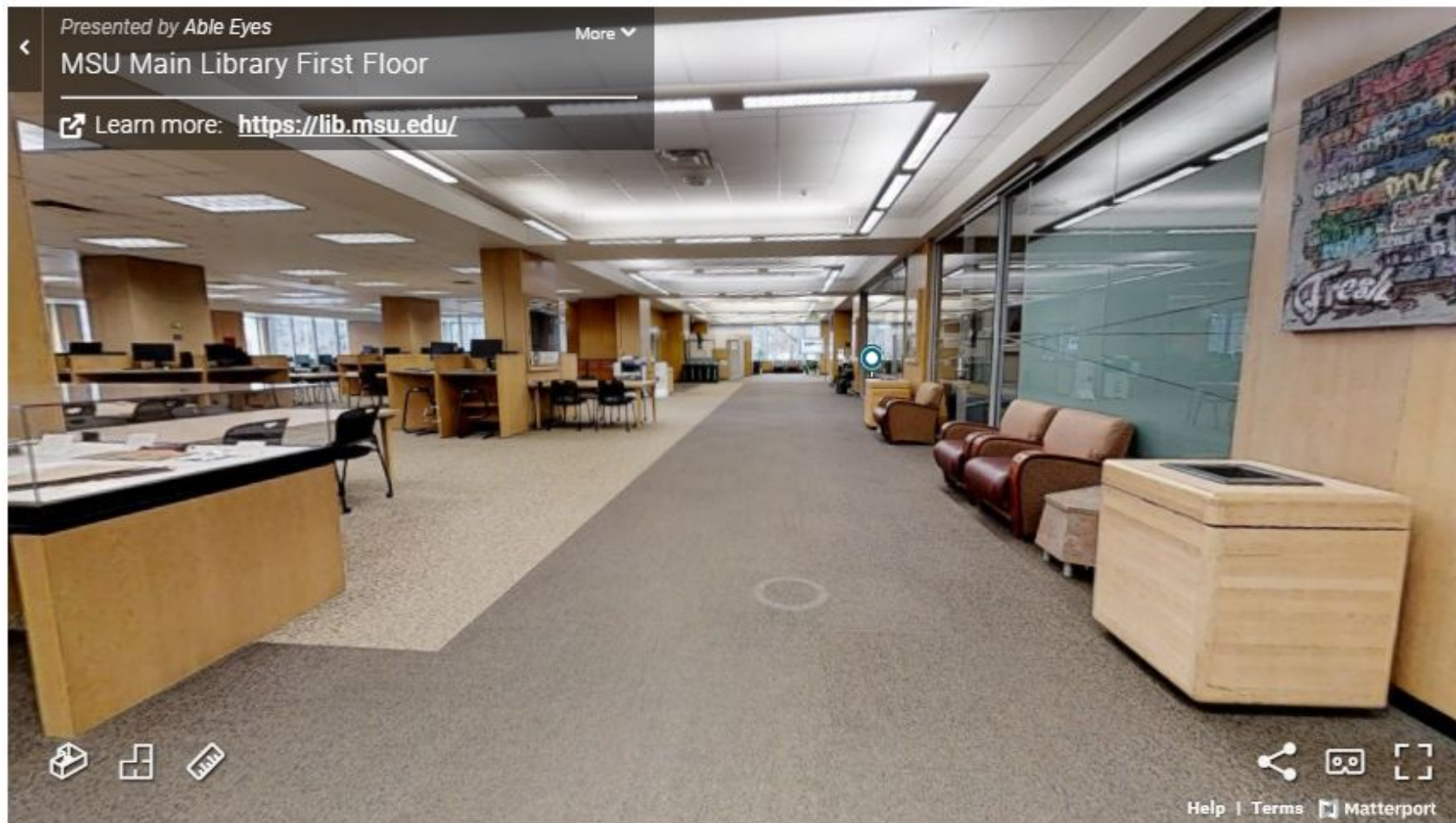

Screen readers can navigate content by headings and can skip to links

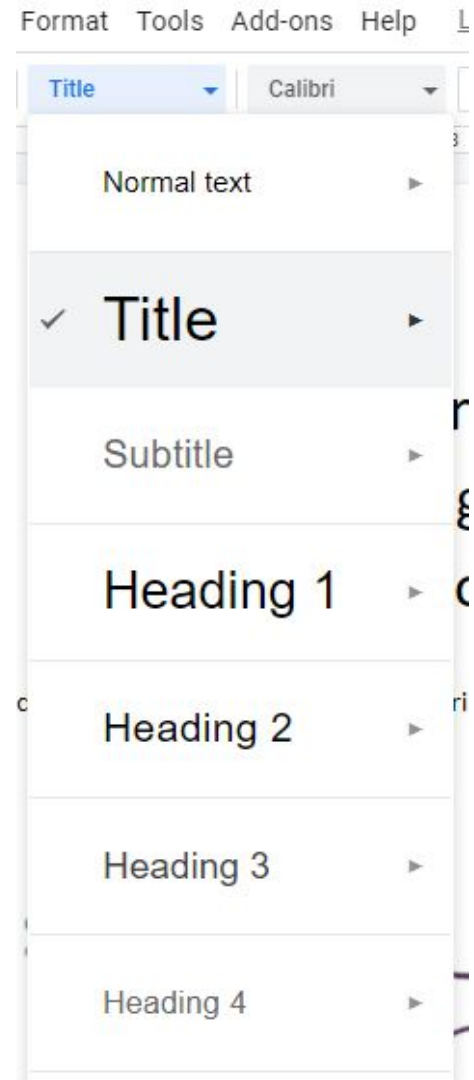
Use descriptive hyperlink text (**not** “click here”)

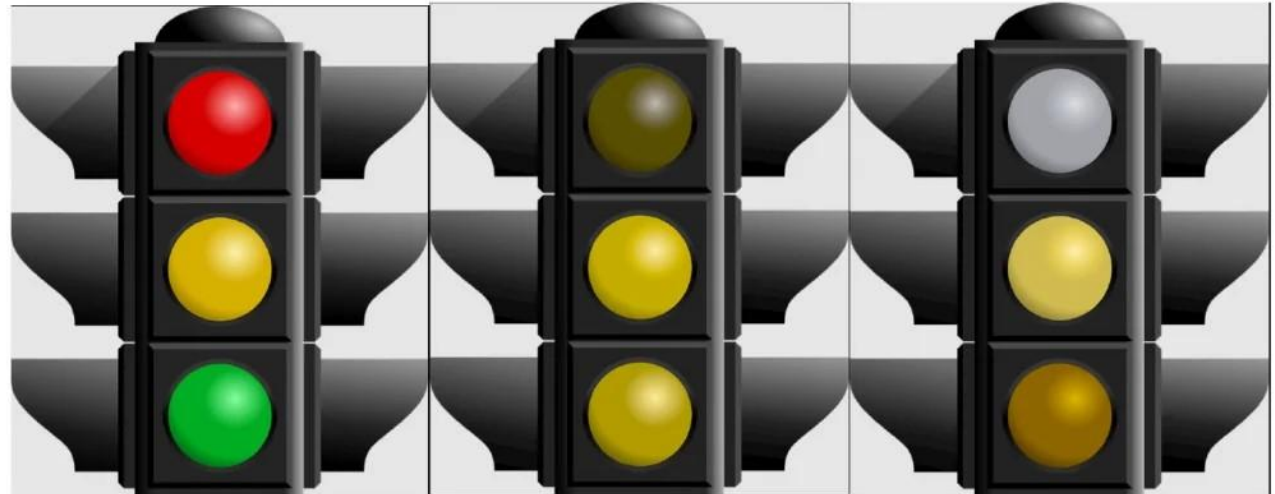
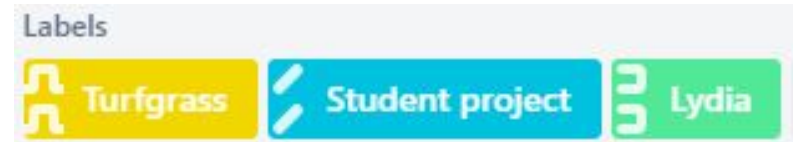

- Font: Sans Serif is easier to read, *not this*
- Don't rely on only color to convey significance.

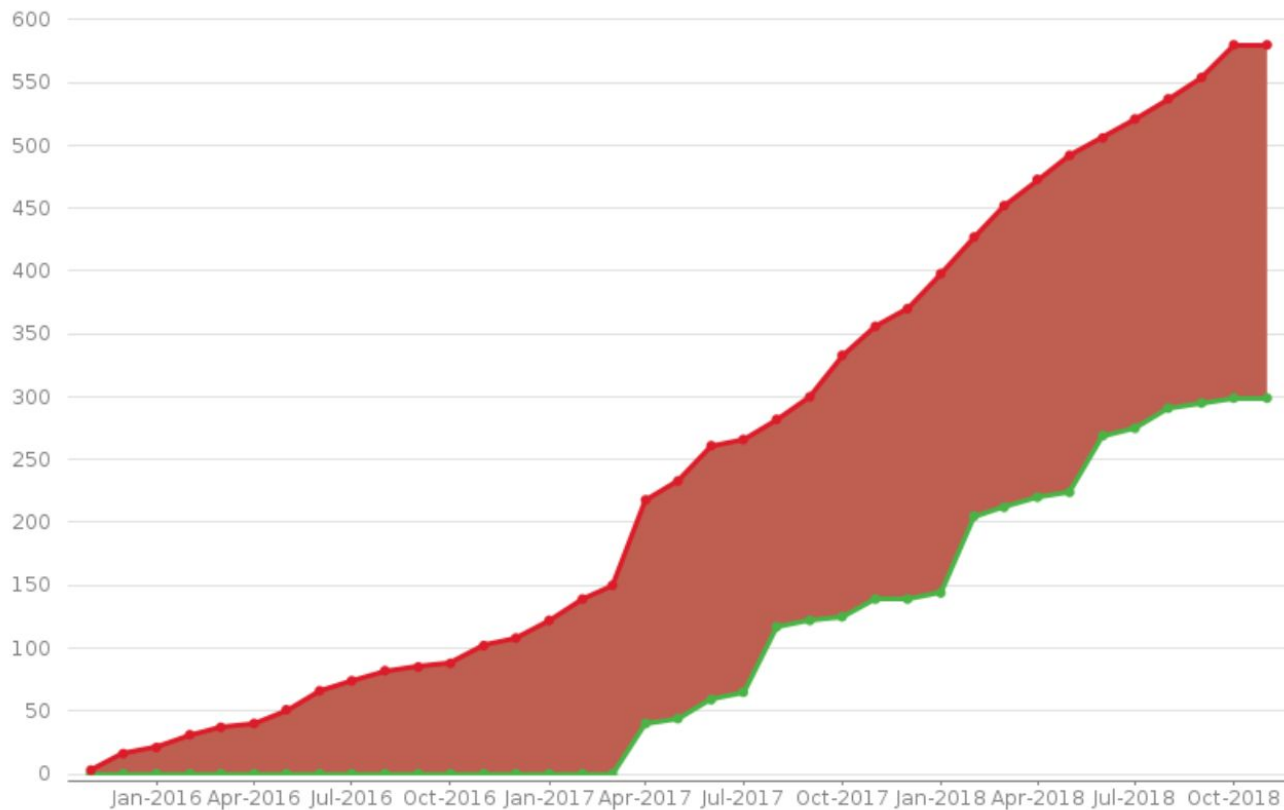
